


My love for bird hunting started at the early age of 10. I have hunted most species of upland birds and waterfowl, but I prefer pheasants, and ducks. I recall in my early years that our waterfowl gear consisted of not only decoys but included a fishing pole equipped with a huge daredevil lure, a necessary tool for retrieving waterfowl. A cold swim was in order on occasions. My first

hunting dog came into my life when I was junior in high school, a short hair named HOMER. Even with Homer our equipment included the fishing rod, but now included shotgun shells, rocks and sticks all of which were necessary to convince "Homer", to make that swim; which he did on occasions, but

mostly not. We have progressed since then.

Being born and raised in the great state of South Dakota until my early teenage years has obviously enhanced my love for pheasant hunting. My father's business commitments led us into Nebraska, Colorado and Missouri, each new state providing another bird hunting challenge. After high school, a year in college and a 6 year hitch in the Army I found home in Alaska for the next 14 years. It was during this period that I got lucky and married an awesome lady, Jackie Bain, who has been my biggest fan and has supported my outdoor enthusiasm with a passion for the last 34 years. While in Alaska I discovered also the benefits of a trained hunting retriever. It was here that I joined my first retriever association, the Alaska Retriever Club and ultimately the North American Hunting Retriever Association. In 1985, I was a member of a small group of hunters that banded together to start the first NAHRA program in Alaska, the Midnight Sun Gun Dog Association. I have been associated with the NAHRA program since then.

My business commitments in 1987 found me traveling across the U.S. and Europe. Each stop providing my family with different hunting and retriever opportunities and more importantly, adding many families to our list of valued friends. I am firmly convinced that through retriever programs

there is no place another friend can't be made.

My NAHRA judging assignments began in 1985 while residing in Alaska. Judging has been a very rewarding experience. It has helped me as a trainer, and provided me with the tools to better understand dogs, testing and ultimately handlers.

I retired from the Corps of Engineers in 2005 and have operated SODAK Pheasant Camp, in Presho, South Dakota since then. I have returned to my roots and am currently doing what I love

best, training dogs and hunting birds (occasionally we catch a few walleyes too).

I am honored to have been selected as a judge for the 2010 Invitational and pledge to provide hunting tests deserving of this program, the participants and ultimately their dogs. Thanks for providing me with this opportunity.











Wow is the first word to say in describing this great honor in judging NAHRA's finest dogs. It is with great humility that I have accepted this position to judge your dogs. It is always an honor and I learn so much from looking over your shoulders. My thanks go out to the search committee to be chosen for this upcoming INVITATIONAL.

Many years ago (about 42) I decided a dog was needed to prevent me from getting wet retrieving ducks in mill ponds in eastern NC. Hailing from this area put me in the middle of real waterfowl and quail country and I did not have enough room or money to have several different dogs so I chose a lab and taught him how to retrieve birds as well as hunt upland game. Richard Wolters was my teacher with "Water Dog" and I was well equipped with a great dog (or so I thought at that time). To say I was ostracized by the true and blue pointer guys would be an understatement but I really did not care as my dog did very well. He did not point as some of my dogs have but he certainly got birdie and I learned to read him and his language and we were a successful team.

That to me is what NAHRA is all about today. Being a team player with your dog and teaching and learning together to be a great conservation tool goes a long way with friends, family and those who have chosen not to hunt and in fact has brought a lot of folks along the way that would not be here otherwise. I know of no better game in town than NAHRA, bar none, when it comes to friends, dogs and "family" atmosphere.

I have had the opportunity of qualifying several dogs in several Invitational's in North America. I have been asked to judge in many Regional's from the east to the west coast and have enjoyed them all. I am constantly learning from my dogs as well as other judges and handlers and the older I get, the more fun I have as I am understanding the component of chilling out and having fun. I regret my errors as much as the next person and am very competitive but at the end of the day, realize if I am not having fun, I am in the wrong place.

Presently and most importantly I am flanked by my wife Colleen who started hunting with me as she appreciated seeing the dogs work both in water and upland environments. So NAHRA has helped me enjoy hunting with my soul mate and for this, I am very appreciative. My daughters Brooks and Paige both love labs and presently one of them has a dog bred by us which is a hunter and pal. The other has recently finished school and will be in the retriever family soon. I am guided by three labs all related with one of them being a GMHRCH with several RAW qualifications. The other two are GMHR"s with qualifications in a RAW as well. I have had other labs with all of them obtaining GMHR and qualifying in RAW's across the country. One of my best buddies ever is our sheltie, Caribou who thinks he can retrieve better, faster and smarter than any lab around. He chooses not to do water and believes that is why we have labs.

More importantly these dogs of ours are our friends and they teach us a lot about life. They all come to work with us every day and greet all the folks who come into our office with a wag of the tail and a lick if they are lucky. Maybe one day I will be able to be the person I should be to people and my dogs on a more consistent basis. God I sure hope so. I have certainly had enough training. So, my job as I see it is to provide you with a very fair test, a fair grading procedure and a challenge you will appreciate and remember. For it is the challenge that causes us to rise and it brings out the best in us and our dogs. It may be a bit tough but it is always appreciated over a test that is just bland. Enjoy your time here at the Invitational and do your best and leave the rest up to us. Have a great time, enjoy your dogs and when you come to the line, take a deep breath, ask questions and then work as a team to accomplish what you must. Thanks again for allowing me to judge you and your dog during this special time.










My passion for hunting retrievers started in my teens while hunting at a duck club with my father in California. Hudson, a black Labrador, was one of the few trained retrievers at the club. One December morning, "Hud's" owner was unable to answer the early call to go hunting, so another member took him to the duck blind. As the morning sun was rising, the member arose from his blind and shot a lone pintail, sending it crashing onto the pond with a broken wing. However, the bird was still very much alive. Hud charged to the crippled duck, and quickly scooped it up. To our dismay, instead of returning with the duck, Hud ran the quarter mile back to the clubhouse where he presented his sleeping owner with his still very lively prize. 


#### Addy MHR Kali's Addagirl Kody Bull


#### Chai GMHR II HR UH Holzingers Chai Latte MH Dan Hove

Corky was born one week after my last visit to an Invitational. My how time flys. Though she loves to hunt, it is a hot and cold situation at field tests. She is one of the most intelligent dogs I have ever owned. That sounds great, but it can also be a curse at times. What's going thru that canine brain of hers is sometimes a mystery, though the results can sometimes be quite comical. As we have plodded along these past nine years there have been streaks of exceptional work mixed with a few times of darkness. Each dog I have trained has been

quite different in strengths and tendencies. This has matured me as a dog trainer, but at the cost of inserting a few bad habits in my pupils as my knowledge developed. Despite all this her pass rate is well above the average and she is on the verge of reaching 1,000 points. Maybe I am being too critical, as she is actually a wonderful dog. I am proud to have Corky associated with this group of the greatest hunting dogs around. At nine hard years her eyes and ears are just starting to slide, but I am hopeful she will hold her own among the best.



#### D.D. MHR HR UH Marshes Call Brandy SH WDX Tim Lockard

I joined NAHRA in 1985 after viewing Richard Wolters "Game Dog" video and reading his book "Game Dog". Richard devoted a chapter of the book to NAHRA and the concept of non-competitive dog games for the average joe really peaked my interest. I was started training my chessie pup Drake using the information in Richard's video and books. One afternoon I was exploring the country side for places to train and hunt with the dogs and I found what looked to be a great lake and ponds to swim the dogs. As I walked around the lake I heard some whistle blasts and voices from the other side of the property. Further investigation found two gentleman with a black Lab that was doing some terrific work, just like Tar in Richard's video. What luck I had that day out in the middle of

nowhere at a place named Dewatto. They told me about the Puget Sound Retriever Club and a upcoming field trial in the town of Belfair. I found the trial, met new folks, got to throw some dead ducks for the dogs, watch some great dog work, and I was hooked!

I entered Drake in our first NAHRA field test at the Rainier Hunting Retriever Club near Seattle in 1986, we ran in the Started Stake and although we did not qualify that day it was the start of a long journey together and the making of many great memories.

#### Memorable Moment

On an afternoon pheasant hunt in which she received a puncture wound to the chest behind the right front leg that went undetected for 2 hours of hunting. Brandy kept on going as if nothing at all was wrong! It was several hours later when we got to a 24 hour vet clinic in Tacoma and had her sewed back together. She missed the remainder of the hunting season while her wound healed. Not a good moment, but it turned out ok and could have easily ended much worse.

Daisy is my fifth MHR and the third Caerleon dog that I have had in the NAHRA program. All of my dogs are hunting dogs and household companions first and field test dogs second to maintain conditioning in the off season. I expect my dogs to handle everything from blue grouse, chukars, and quail in one day on the breaks of the Salmon River to field shoots with ducks and geese in Alberta and have never been let down. The NAHRA program has encouraged me to develop each dog to a higher level and resulted in

many memorable experiences along the way, thanks for everything, Al Black.

#### Memorable Moment

The first thing that I need to say is that he is my best friend, best buddy and some times the most frustrating dog, when it comes to Hunt Tests. He can take a day and make it so much fun to have him with me and in the next moment, turn it into a nightmare. Anyone that has seen Duke run knows he can do the work, sometimes in an out of order way, but still get things done. He is just different in the way he thinks and so am I so we get along and have fun most of the time. Duke is getting up there in age, almost ten now, so with a little help from God he will still have a couple of years left to run more Hunt tests and bring back many more birds, or at least create memories to last the rest of my life. To all my NAHRA friends it has been some of the most enjoyable times, running with and just sharing experiences during the nine plus years that I have been involved with this organization. I have learned so much, talking and training with all my friends. I will be needing to get another dog in a

couple of years and start over, so the cycle will start over, hope I can make it thru this again.

#### Memorable Moment

The first thing that comes to my mind is a Hunt Test, intermediate in Puget Sound. I sent Duke to the first bird and he picked it up and with out returning to give the bird to me he just ran over and picked up the second and brought both back, delivered to hand and we were done in a very short time. There are many more memories in all the tests and hunting trips I have taken, and I hope to have many more in the next few years.





## Duke MHR Awrey Semper Copper Redcloud SH WCX CCA Kent Walker

Duke is my 1st "real" hunting dog. Duke's hardworking attitude has made him a pleasure to be with afield. All he ever wants to do is to please me and I do my best to hold up my end of the bargain. When we we bred Duke's mom (Brandi) I didn't know quite what I was getting into or to expect. For my first trained hunting dog, he's been all I can ask for. As for NAHRA, I wanted an environment that I could work with other dog handlers — more experienced than myself — to help me train Duke to be all he could be. I couldn't have done this on my own and I couldn't have gotten him to this level without my friends in NAHRA. You will never meet a group of men and women more friendly, open and willing to share what they know about training dogs anywhere else. (I know this because I also run and judge in AKC Hunt test events.) Through my years of running and judging in NAHRA, I simply have not met a nicer group of people. I truly believe that a Master Hunter trained NAHRA dog is THE all around hunting retriever. I'm so proud of how far Duke has come and how we

have progressed as a team. It's an honor to participate in the Richard A Wolters Invitational.

#### Memorable Moment

Last year Duke and I were invited to a Youth Waterfowl Hunt in Idaho. Having never been involved with something like this, we didn't know what to expect. Duke and I were teamed up with two men and their sons the morning of the hunt—and off we went in my duck boat. We had been assigned a nice little honey hole that no one else could get to with their larger boats. So drop off the dads and kids, throw out some decoys and wait for the flight. Duke set the tone that he was ready and well trained at the first pair of shots and a double. He marked both birds, one of them a cripple. He retrieved the dead go bird and then he remembered the 2nd fall. He was cast to the area, where he picked up a trail across a pond through some very thick, brush to find this crippled Widgeon. My guests couldn't believe their eyes. I, of course, held my chest out like my son had just hit a winning home run in the 9th iming. That day ended up with 8 birds in the bag, the best of all the hunting parties that day which was totally due to Duke. If it hadn't been for him, I would have been able to wade out into the pond and retrieve 2 of the birds. (the others fell in thick brush, crippled and running) I was proud to be with him that day.







## Dusty GMHR Dusty's Desert Strom Carl Strebe

I never know what to expect from Dusty. His hunting ability is second to none. However, it's his nemesis for the hunt test. He can do the work so long as He doesn't let his nerves get the best of him. His talent will certainly be tested during the Invitational.

#### Memorable Moment

Dusty had a great hunt test going for him in Montana for his GMHR. The last event was the quarter and steady to flush. He does a nice job quartering and the chuckar is launched between two dogs in brace. The bird drops behind the gunner. Dusty's on the move fast. Stops one yard from the chuckar on the whistle. 
#### Fortune MHR Critter Creek Worth A Million Joan Sharpless

I think that the memorable experience is just being able to sit on the tailgate of the truck after a training session with my arm around her watching the sunset and thinking about how life is good.






Holly GMHR Waterland's Nitro Charged Hurricane Holly SH Bob Boeh

I have a saying which is: It's not Wishful Thinking if you have Hope.






#### Ink Spot MHR FTCH, AFTCH RDC's Jazztime Trips Ink Spot MH Rod Adlington


#### Smokey GMHR Magic's Smokin' TNT Explosion John Johnson




#### Tansy GMHR MHR Rivendell's Midnight Tansy Paul Pommerening
